Social Studies 9

Course Description

In Social Studies 9, students explore how ideas, geography, and power shaped Canada and the world, learning about rebellions, immigration, and how different groups were treated. Students will develop their research skills, use evidence to support their ideas, and properly credit their sources.

Big Ideas

The following points are adapted from the Social Studies 9 BC Curriculum:

- The natural environment plays an important role in shaping political, social, and economic changes.
- New ideas and beliefs can strongly shape how societies develop and respond to events.
- Differences in power can affect relationships between people and groups.
- Collective identity is built over time and can change with new experiences and perspectives.

Expectations

- Students are expected to login at least three times a week and are expected to complete the first activity within two weeks of enrolling. If they do not log in for more than a week, they will receive two notifications through *Brightspace course mail*. No response within a week may lead to withdrawal.
- A maximum of two activities (e.g., assignments, quizzes) may be submitted per week.
- The course should be completed in about four months.
- Student questions and messages must be sent using *Brightspace course mail*.
- Work must be written in the student's own words and voice.

- If authorship is unclear, supervised in-class writing may be scheduled by the teacher to support academic integrity.
